C. Additional remarks/restrictions

Study programme for exchange students

- It is not possible for students to hand-in their final BSc-/MSc-/PhD-thesis at the host institution. Final theses need to be graded and supervised by the home institution.
- Exchange students are expected to stay and study for the complete duration of the semester. It is not possible to arrive later than the start date of the semester, nor to end the exchange before the end of the semester (except in special circumstances).
- It is not possible to attend courses as an auditor. Students have to attend all sessions and participate actively in class discussions and presentations and are also required to take the exam(s).

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 Exchange students nominated to the Faculty of Science are expected to take their courses at the Faculty of Science. Exchange students are initially limited to courses from the study area of the exchange agreement. In some cases it is possible to choose courses from a wider range of study areas within the faculty. This option can in due time be discussed with the Exchange Coordinator of the Faculty of Science. It is sometimes possible for students to take one or two courses at another faculty, though this cannot be guaranteed.

Master programmes

- Students who wish to apply for master courses must have obtained a bachelor degree (or equivalent of 180 EC) in the relevant study area. Acceptance into courses on master level is dependent on the approval of the master programme coordinator. An official English language certificate is obligatory to participate in English taught master courses.
- Courses of certain selective master's programmes and Academic English courses are not open to exchange students. These are:
 - Courses of the master programme Artificial Intelligence are (partially) restricted. Placement cannot be guaranteed.
 - Courses of the master programme Biomedical Sciences, Neurobiology cluster
 - Courses of the master programme Forensic Science
 - Courses of the master programme Security and Network Engineering
 - Academic skills courses (Academic English, Teaching skills, etc.)

	Courses last for one, two or three periods. The length of a course is indicated in the course catalogue. Courses do not run for the complete academic year. When selecting courses please note that you should divide your study load equally. For example if you are selecting a standard study load of 30 EC per semester, you should select 12 EC in period 1, 12 EC in period 2 and 6 EC in period 3, as period 3 is the shortest period.
Credit system	The University of Amsterdam uses the European Credit System (ECTS, EC's). The standard workload for full-time students is 60 EC per academic year (1680 hours of study) or 30 EC per semester (840 hours of study).
Workload	 The credit system is based on student workload. Student workload does not only consist of lectures and seminars, but also of individual study. The workload is expressed in credit points based on the ECTS. 1 EC represents 28 hours of full-time study, including lecture attendance, hours spent on
Language	 individual study and preparation of assignments. Some bachelor courses are taught in English. For more information go to: www.uva.nl/exchange-science All master courses are taught in English.
Duration of programmes	A bachelor's programme (Bachelor of Science) has a duration of three years (180 EC). A master's programme (Master of Science) has a duration of either one year (60 EC, regular master) or two years in case of a (120 EC, research master).
Type of education	There are different types of education. Lectures are frequently used as well as seminars and self-study. In seminars an active participation is expected. Students are expected to attend all classes. First course of the semester is obligatory. Canvas, our digital learning environment, is used to prepare for classes, for discussions and exams.
Assessment	Various types of exams are practiced: written exams, essays, class room presentation and assignments.

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Academic climate	The UvA places a strong emphasis on independent and critical thinking. Students are expected to study independently. There is a lot of self-study required. Students find the academic climate challenging but rewarding.		
	Exams and assessment are not only scheduled at the end of a course but students can also find themselves doing weekly assignments such as small essays or reports and most courses have mid-term as well as final exams.		
	It is not common for teachers to be more lenient or easy on the exchange students. Exchange students are expected to fully participate in courses, there are no auditor-only options.		
Courses	Courses can be found in the course catalogue: <u>www.coursecatalogue.uva.nl</u> There is a limited amount of courses in English with a limited amount of places available for exchange students. Therefore it is very important for students to keep back-up courses in mind and be flexible about the course choices.

2. Grading system

In the Netherlands grades are awarded on a grading scale from 1-10, 10 being the highest. A passing grade is a 6 or higher. Very good/excellent grades are an 8 or higher. A 'pass' is given for courses/seminars which are not graded, but for which the student has met the requirements
